Academic Integrity at IU

- <u>Student Academic Integrity and Faculty</u>
 <u>Responsibilities</u> (for faculty and teaching assistants)

The Learning with Integrity Canvas course helps undergraduate students gain a better understanding about the importance of academic integrity, types of academic misconduct, and about consequences from engagement in academic misconduct. Students self-enroll, work at their own pace, and are issued a certificate of completion. The course includes short videos and questions that may be used as discussion prompts in your course. - 2. What are the different types of academic misconduct?
- 3. What should you do if you suspect a student has been involved in academic dishonesty?
